Labor, Minorities, Women Under Attack

Capitalist Injustice and the Supreme Court

A series of reactionary Supreme Court rulings last month, followed by Donald Trump's nomination of ultraconservative Brett Kavanaugh to a newly vacant court seat, has struck fear into huge swaths of the population. And for good reason. Kavanaugh's confirmation would give the Supreme Court a solid right-wing majority lasting perhaps a generation. This would strengthen the hand of the capitalist rulers in their drive to crush the already attenuated rights of the working class and oppressed. Having targeted the unions, blacks, immigrants and other minorities, the forces of capitalist reaction have their guns set on eliminating women's right to abortion.

In late June, the Supreme Court declared war on public workers unions, the largest remaining concentration of organized labor, when it ruled against the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees in the Janus case. The decision eliminates the agency shop in the public sector, under which all employees have to pay union member dues or "agency fees" if they choose not to join the union since they benefit from the union bargaining on their behalf. As we noted in "Janus Case: Assault on Labor" (WV No. 1133, 4 May), the intention is to bankrupt, e.g., destroy, the unions by bleeding them of members, posing a direct threat to all of labor, including private-sector unions. Even before Janus came down, a court case was initiated in Washington State demanding that a large state union "disgorge and refund" fees that nonmembers had already paid. This would be larceny with legal sanction.

The Janus ruling will particularly hit hard against black workers, who are heavily represented in the public sector. In yet another blow to black people, the Supreme Court upheld Ohio's system for purging voters from the rolls. This was a continuation of the attack on voting rights for black people and the poor; in 2013, the


Court had already effectively gutted the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

This year's round of reactionary legal decrees began with an early June decision supporting a Colorado baker who, citing religious beliefs, refused to make a wedding cake for a gay couple. It was no more about a cake than the sit-ins at Woolworth's lunch counters in the early 1960s were about coffee. While couched in narrow legal terms, the ruling gives a green light to use a theological justification to trample on the rights of gays, transgender people and any other persona non grata.

The Court then approved Trump's permanent ban on citizens of seven, largely Muslim, countries from entering the U.S. Like the roundups and detentions at the Mexican border, Trump's ban plays to his white-supremacist base, including border guards and other law-and-order forces, whipping them up for further acts of racist violence.

Then came the nomination of Kavanaugh, whose credentials include upholding state voter suppression laws, opposing affirmative action and abortion rights, and repeatedly ruling in favor of employers in workplace discrimination cases. Like Neil Gorsuch, Trump's earlier Court appointee, Kavanaugh was promoted by the reactionary Federalist Society. Formed in 1982 by law students whose central goal was to limit, obstruct and overturn enforcement of the Civil Rights and Voting Rights acts, the society counted among its mentors Yale law professor Robert Bork, an outright racist who once wrote that a law insisting that restaurants serve black people would be a "principle of unsurpassed ugliness." It is no accident that the Christian fundamentalists who are mobilizing against abortion had their origins as a political force 50 years ago in the crusade to maintain racial segregation.

The promotion of the Catholic reactionary Kavanaugh has energized "right to life" bigots who see their best opening in nearly 50 years to undo the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision. If Roe is overturned and abortion thrown back to state legislatures, it would be catastrophic, resurrecting the days of back-alley abortions and making the already growing number of doit-yourself abortions the norm. Minority, poor and working-class women, millions

simple medical procedure through myriad state restrictions and lack of funds, would especially suffer.

Against the ghoulish Republicans, whose slogan to "make America great again" conjures up an earlier time of U.S. supremacy when black people and women supposedly knew "their place," the Democrats see an opportunity to build their anti-Trump "resistance" so they can win the midterm elections and eventually take back the White House. No less than the GOP, the Democratic Party represents the same capitalist system, which is driven by the brutal exploitation of the working class and based on the vicious oppression of black people, who are segregated in the mass at the bottom of society.

It was the Democrats' own attacks on the unions, immigrants and others that paved the way for the current Republican offensive. What is desperately needed is militant class struggle to strike a blow against the endless ruling-class onslaught. Key to this perspective is the fight to break the allegiance of the labor movement to Democratic Party "lesser-evilism."

Behind the Black Robes

Labor leaders, feminists and the liberal press claim that the way to fight is through the ballot box: elect more Democrats, who will in turn appoint more friendly judges. But under capitalism, regardless of which political wing of the bourgeoisie holds power, the judiciary is an arm of the bourgeois state machine, whose purpose is to defend capitalist class rule against the exploited and oppressed. Along with the courts, the core of the capitalist state apparatus includes the police, prisons and the military.

On July 9, the same day as Kavanaugh's nomination, the New York Times published an editorial bemoaning how the "Constitution is about to be hijacked by a small group of conservative radicals well funded by ideological and corporate interests." Demonstrating bipartisan civility, it simultaneously published an op-ed piece titled, "A Liberal's Case for Brett Kavanaugh," which praised the president

Abolish the Monarchy!

Harry Foregoes Swastika at Royal Wedding

The phrase "bread and circuses" coined by the Roman satirist Juvenaldescribes the means by which an exploiting class seeks to divert the plebs from thoughts of rebellion. While Britain's capitalist rulers don't bother much with the bread, royal births and weddings are milked for all they're worth. In the latest royal circus, Prince Harry, whose most memorable previous exploit was to dress in Nazi regalia for a "natives and colonials" party, was married to mixed-race American actress Meghan Markle. Up to 1,200 hand-picked "commoners" were allowed within the perimeter of Windsor Castle to join in the celebrations, although

they were expected to bring their own food and drink.

The admittance of a black woman into the House of Windsor (now she's got her visa sorted and been baptised in the Church of England) is absurdly presented by a fawning bourgeois media as the recasting of the feudal freak show that is the monarchy to be less "gammon" [white conservative] and more "woke." One Guardian article (20 May) described the wedding as a "rousing celebration of blackness"; a black gospel choir sang and the black Episcopalian bishop Michael Curry began his sermon with a quote from Martin Luther King Jr. and talked about the misery of slavery.

The British monarchy knows a thing or two about slavery—its empire was built in part on the trade in African men, women and children. Royal "tradition" is inextricably tied to the blood-soaked history of British colonial subjugation of countless millions of mainly dark-skinned people, a past that is still embodied in the British Commonwealth, with the monarch at its head. The then-Trotskyist Socialist Workers Party, facing persecution themselves for opposing U.S. imperialist war aims, were among the very few—including the Quakers—who courageously campaigned against the repression of Japanese Americans. We print below an excerpt from an article they wrote shortly after the roundups began.

A minority problem as acute as any in Europe is being created by the forced removal of Japanese-Americans from the Pacific Coast.

In a move unprecedented in U.S. history, American citizens are being taken from their homes and transported to hastily constructed concentration camps....

Evacuations are being enforced by army officials acting under a presidential decree empowering them to bar from certain areas any person they consider undesirable. The army command has power to declare any district a restricted area and to order the removal of any residents. No reason need be given for the evacuation, and American citizenship is no protection.

So far the measure has been applied only to Japanese-Americans and to enemy aliens: but militant workers, liberals or "uncooperative" citizens could be ousted similarly.

After Pearl Harbor, the press whipped up an hysterical picture of a West Coast invasion aided by Japanese-American residents. The administration had to make a decisive move to show West Coast residents it was alert to their danger. The FBI rounded up all suspected enemy agents in the first few days of the war, but this was not demonstrative enough to give the effect of energetic preparedness the administration was seeking to offset Pearl Harbor.

Considerable pressure for the ousting of Japanese-Americans came, however, from California Chambers of Commerce, the Bank of America, and the reactionary Associated Farmers. These groups see in the Japanese-American farmer not a military menace, but an obstacle to their complete domination of California agriculture. Taking advantage of the situation to demand their ousting in the name of "national defense," California bankers hope to seize control of the truck gardening fields vacated by the Japanese-Americans....

And so the story of the Japanese-American evacuations stands today—a repressive measure, based purely on racial discrimination and motivated chiefly by the desire of Big Business for additional profits, which is presented as a necessary part of the "war for democracy."

approached, images of the burnt-out shell of Grenfell Tower [housing project where fire killed 72 poor and immigrant residents in 2017] and the racist abuse of the "Windrush generation" of Commonwealth citizens [post-WWII immigrants from the Caribbean] offered stark reminders that capitalist Britain remains a racist hellhole.

For Prince Harry, posing as a Nazi was not merely "insensitive" youthful high jinks, as the media would have it. It is no accident that the authoritarianism of the jack-booted Nazi regime exerts an attraction on the monarchy. In 2015, the Sun made public a Windsor family home movie from the 1930s which showed the Queen's mother, Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, teaching the seven-year-old Elizabeth how to salute like a Nazi. Also seen giving the stiff-armed salute was the future Edward VIII, the Queen's uncle, who was notorious for his Nazi sympathies and friendship with Adolf Hitler.

Thus does the House of Windsor (formerly House of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, before the anti-German sentiment whipped up during World War I mandated a name change) express in unvarnished fashion the haughty contempt of the British imperialist ruling class for working-class people and the rulers' feelings of racial superiority over their former colonial slaves. The royal family remains the embodiment of the reactionary "United Kingdom," which incorporates the Orange statelet in Northern Ireland and rests on English domination over the Scottish and Welsh nations. The monarchy's linchpin role in the United Kingdom is captured by the fact that Harry was not only made Duke of Sussex but was also given newly minted Scottish and Northern Irish titles: Earl of Dumbarton and Baron Kilkeel.

The role of the monarchy at the pinnacle of British imperialism is far from simply ornamental. The monarchy is a potential rallying point for reaction in times of social crisis, when the bourgeoisie feels

capitalists and priests.



I know that those echoes will return a third time to finish what the Civil War started, to overthrow racist American capitalism and sweep the brutal oppression and exploitation of this rotten system into the dustbin of history. *That* will be something to celebrate.

Killed on the Docks


Salute to Fallen ILWU Militant

On June 28, 34-year-old longshore worker Byron Jacobs was killed on the docks in Longview, Washington, when a mooring line being used to move a ship down the pier snapped, recoiled and hit Byron at a speed of over 450 miles per hour. The chief mate of the ship, 41-year-old Pingshan Li, who was struck by the other end of the line, died a few hours later. A fifth-generation longshoreman, Byron was secretarytreasurer of International Longshore and Warehouse Union (ILWU) Local 21 when he stood on the union's front lines during its 2011-12 battle against the all-out union-busting offensive by the Export Grain Terminal (EGT) bosses in Longview. WV labor correspondent Gene Herson noted in a July 3 letter of condolence to Local 21 (printed below) that the courage and determination of Byron and other unionists, fighting with a militancy not seen in this country in decades, was an inspiration for all of labor.

At a July 6 memorial meeting, a WV representative joined hundreds of ILWU members and other unionists alongside the Jacobs family and friends to commemorate Byron's life. His stepfather proudly recalled Byron leading the charge to defend ILWU International president Robert McEllrath, who was being dragged away by the cops who had brutally attacked a 300-strong picket line that blocked a train loaded with grain headed for the EGT terminal on 7 September 2011. Many others recalled Byron's courageous defense of members of Local 21's women's auxiliary against the cops a few

Despite facing multiple felony charges for his heroic actions, Byron never retreated from the fight. But the ILWU International leadership did. In the end, as military forces were mobilized by the Obama administration to escort the first shipment of scab grain out of the EGT terminal, an agreement between the union and company was signed. The contract set a trend for other Pacific Northwest grain bosses in their war against the ILWU. Sacrificing workers' safety, these agreements allowed for dangerous 12-hour work shifts and undermined previous provisions allowing the union to "stand by" (stop work) when safety was threatened.

In a letter to the Longview Daily News (7 July) following the deaths of Byron Jacobs and Pingshan Li, one retired ship pilot wrote: "I don't know the specifics what went wrong here, but in my years as a ship pilot, I learned how quickly Longview's swirling, weaving river current can introduce sudden and extreme line stress.... I advocated hiring a pilot and tug for less than ideal conditions. However, I think cost-conscious ship's captains still make the call." In a recent phone call, Dan Coffman, former president of Local 21, noted that: "In the early days, we used to use a lot of tug assists and they've gotten away from that." He went on, "It was all Byron Jacobs

about dollars and cents and so they quit using the tugs."

Byron's wife Megan has filed a \$16 million lawsuit against the ship's owner and the company operating it. Although no amount of money could ever compensate for Byron's life and his family's devastation, the ILWU should make sure that she gets every penny.

For the shipping companies and terminal operators, workplace injuries and death are simply collateral damage in their pursuit of higher profits. A genuine tribute to the life of Byron Jacobs would be for the union to fight to build union safety committees with the authority to shut down unsafe work on the spot, and to set the terms for practices that would preserve the life and limbs of longshore and all maritime workers. Byron proudly traced his fighting spirit back to his Lumbee Indian kin who drove the Klan out of their North Carolina county in 1958. He embodied many of the qualities necessary to forge a union leadership that will mobilize labor's power in defense of the interests of the working class, as well as all of the oppressed.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I am writing to express my deepest condolences and those of my comrades to the members of ILWU Local 21 as well as the family and other friends of Byron Jacobs. His tragic and horrific death is a body blow to all fighters for labor's cause against the cutthroat employers.

I met Byron during Local 21's battle against EGT's union-busting assault during which I traveled to Longview several times as a labor reporter for Workers Vanguard. He was not only a true union stalwart but someone who had a thoughtful and keen appreciation of the plight of others. In many ways, this was exemplified when Byron courageously came to the defense of Ladies Auxiliary members who were under police attack during the ILWU's September 21, 2011 protest against a train bound for the EGT terminal. It was such militancy and determination which inspired many other trade unionists in the region and around the country.

My comrade Tony who got to know Byron recalls his amusement that rather than being made to serve jail time, the court sentenced him to an "anger management" class. Anyone who knew Byron knew him as a kind, gentle and big-hearted man. It was exactly those qualities that made him such a determined fighter against the real injustices perpetrated by the bosses with the backing of the police, courts and government of this country.

As a former member of the National Maritime Union for 20 years whose arm was pulverized in the process of shifting a ship, I know the deadly dangers longshoremen and other maritime workers face. More often than not this is at the hands of companies trying to save money by cutting corners on safety. Thus the deep sadness that I felt on learning of Byron's death was also tempered by anger at those who would sacrifice the lives of working people in the service of their bottom line.

Myself and other comrades who met Byron send our deepest sympathies to all of you. It is a devastating loss. The best salute to his life will be to continue the fight for labor's cause and that of all the downtrodden victimized by this brutal society.

its rule threatened. It is not to Parliament but to the Queen that the armed forces swear allegiance. In his 1925 work Where Is Britain Going? Leon Trotsky, co-leader with VI Lenin of the Russian Revolution, noted that Labour MPs [Members of Parliament] of the day voted in Parliament to give funds to the Prince of Wales for an overseas tour. Trotsky sharply observed: "How can they assault bourgeois property if they dare not refuse pocket money to the Prince of Wales?"

This is the tradition upheld by Jeremy Corbyn. While he is constantly goaded by the Tories and the Blairites in his own party for being insufficiently obsequious to the monarchy, Corbyn was nonetheless among those offering his congratulations to "Harry and Meghan." As he prepares for office in the hallowed halls of Westminster, Corbyn's lifelong republicanism has gone the same way as his longstand-

In an interview with the New Statesman (30 July 2015), Corbyn was asked "Would you abolish the monarchy?" His response was: "Listen, I am at heart, as you very well know, a republican. But it's not the fight I'm going to fight: it's not the fight I'm interested in."

We Marxist revolutionaries take inspiration from an altogether different tradition. Oliver Cromwell and the 17th century bourgeois revolutionaries overthrew the feudal order and chopped off the head of Charles I. A workers revolution would have as its first task sweeping away all the feudal crap of the past. Our model is the Bolshevik Party which led the workers and peasants of the Russian tsarist empire in sweeping away the capitalist and landlord exploiters, in the process extinguishing Tsar Nicholas II's Romanov dynasty—relatives of Prince Philip.

When asked to describe the political philosophy of the Queen Mother, one royal secretary quoted the words of the hymn "All things bright and beautiful": "The rich man in his castle, the poor man at his gate—God made them high and lowly and order'd their estate" (Guardian, 15 September 2009). The continued existence of feudal relics such as the monarchy, the House of Lords and the

established churches is indeed an assertion that social privilege, vast inequality and rigid social hierarchy are simply the

"natural" order. These institutions are an affront to the working class and to elementary democratic principles.

The Racist Killing of Colten Boushie

Capitalist Canada: Hellhole for Indigenous Peoples



On February 9, Gerald Stanley, a Saskatchewan farmer, was acquitted of second-degree murder charges by an allwhite jury for the cold-blooded killing of Colten Boushie, a 22-year-old Cree man. On 9 August 2016, after a day at the lake, Boushie and his four friends got a flat tire on their way home and drove onto Stanley's farm seeking help. Stanley, aided by his son, chased the group away with gunfire and then shot Colten in the back of the head at close range. This was a racist atrocity that polarized the country for almost two years. After the not guilty verdict, thousands across Canada protested in angry response. Meanwhile, there was an eruption of racist reaction and a wave of support for Boushie's killer.

This case lays bare the lie of Canada as a progressive, multicultural haven. Cree activist Erica Violet Lee captured this lie in her description of the courtroom during Stanley's trial: "We looked up at the front of the court room and you could see everyone in charge of our fate was white." She continued:

"And above it all, there is a picture of the Queen looking over the court room. We realized this is not a system set up for us: this is not a system set up to keep us safe." Indeed, this is the *bourgeois* justice system and for Indigenous peoples in racist capitalist Canada there is no justice. Rather, the courts, judges and prosecutors, together with the cops and prison guards, are at the core of the capitalist state. The state is an apparatus of violence whose purpose is to defend the class rule and property of the capitalist rulers against the working class and oppressed.

Canada was built on the dispossession of the pre-existing aboriginal inhabitants and the forcible subjugation of the Québécois nation. It is in the interest of the working class to take up the fight against Indigenous oppression and racist reaction.

The historic task of the working class is to sweep away the capitalist system and forge an egalitarian socialist society where production is based on human needs and not profit. The trial and acquittal of Stanley provide a case study in how the machinery of the Canadian capitalist state works to oppress Indigenous peoples.

During his trial, Stanley claimed that his gun "just went off." His lawyer argued that it was a "freak accident," a rare "hang fire" malfunction which caused the gun to fire long after he had pulled the trigger, a defense that gun experts thoroughly refuted. As for the crown [prosecuting] attorney, he might as well have been on Stanley's legal team. As a former chief of the Red Pheasant First Nation put it, "We had to encourage the crown prosecutor to prosecute and not help the defense."

Gerald Stanley got away with killing Colten Boushie, while Boushie's friends and family were treated like criminals. His grieving mother was abused and their home on the Red Pheasant First Nation was invaded and searched by an army of cops, guns drawn. The police detained Boushie's friends, smearing them as potential thieves. One, a young woman, was held for 19 hours without food or sleep. The SUV Boushie was killed in was left unprotected by cops as heavy rain washed away blood, footprints and other evidence. Boushie's dead body was left face down in the gravel on Stanley's farm for over 24 hours.

Colten Boushie was killed for being an Indigenous man on a white man's property. In the vicious backlash that erupted after the murder, local politician Ben Kautz declared that Stanley's "only mistake was leaving three witnesses." White farmers began setting up armed vigilante "community patrols" on the pretext that they are besieged by "rural crime," racist code for Indigenous peoples.

This is the reality in capitalist Canada, where Indigenous lives mean nothing to the ruling class. From coast to coast, Indigenous peoples suffer massive disproportionate incarceration. In Saskatchewan, they are 16 percent of the population, but 81 percent of those sentenced to provincial jails. Women are especially subjected to police violence. A 2016 Human Rights Watch investigation uncovered dozens of cases of assaults, degrading strip searches, sexual abuse and harass-

ment of Indigenous women by Saskatchewan cops.

Bourgeois Hypocrisy and Indigenous Oppression

Liberal prime minister Justin Trudeau and his justice minister Jody Wilson-Raybould responded to the Stanley verdict with empty promises to "do better." Since coming to power in 2015, Trudeau has sought to rebrand Canada as a "progressive" player on the world stage, including by posing as a champion of Indigenous rights. In fact, Trudeau is the enforcer of capitalist rule. The Liberal Party has


Indigenous women—as many as 4,000—who have been murdered or gone missing since 1980. Yet this inquiry, like all the other ones, will change nothing because it will not touch the material conditions of Indigenous life. The ruling class will not provide even the most basic needs for Indigenous peoples: quality education, health and housing programs, clean water and electricity. Rather, they conduct inquiries in order to quell outrage and regain public trust while deflecting attention away from the real workings of this capitalist system.


NDP: Social-Democratic Tool of Capitalist Rule

Federal NDP [New Democratic Party] leader Jagmeet Singh decried the Stanley verdict as an example of the injustice and systemic racism that plagues Indigenous peoples across Canada. But for Singh and the NDP the problem is that without the appearance of justice, people will lose confidence in the system. The NDP is a bourgeois workers party, linked to the trade unions but with a bourgeois program. Their central goal is to administer the capitalist state. By offering up this or that cosmetic reform they serve the interests of the ruling class, deflecting labour and other social struggles into safe parliamentary channels.

In Alberta and B.C. [British Columbia], where the NDP currently rules, the jails are as full of Indigenous peoples as ever, and the grinding poverty and police violence is unchanged. And when the interests of the capitalist class call for the sledgehammer, the NDP in power has not been found wanting, using the power of the state to break strikes and attack minorities. In B.C. in 1995, for example, the NDP government mounted one of the largest military/police operations in Canadian history against Indigenous protesters at Gustafsen Lake. As part of the struggle to forge a revolutionary workers party, it is a strategic task to break workers from the politics of the Anglochauvinist NDP and its social-democratic doctrines which claim that the capitalists and workers share a common interest.

As revolutionary Marxists, we seek to expose illusions in bourgeois democracy and place the struggle for democratic rights within the framework of a class-struggle perspective for proletarian power. Pro-NDP "socialist" groups like





been the main party of the bourgeoisie in Canada for more than 100 years. Alternating with the Conservatives, they have overseen the theft of Indigenous lands along with ceaseless state brutality and repression.

Soon after the verdict, the Trudeau government went into damage-control mode, launching a "review" of the RCMP's [Royal Canadian Mounted Police] actions following Boushie's murder (the RCMP had already cleared itself of all wrongdoing). This is merely one more whitewash. For years, Royal Commissions and inquiries have documented the state's violence against Indigenous peoples, the theft of their lands and children, the staggering suicide rates among young people who see no future for themselves.

The latest is the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls inquiry, created by the Liberals in 2016 in response to a decade of protest over the fates of the Fightback [affiliated with the International Marxist Tendency] do the contrary and push the myth that the capitalist profit system can be reformed. In response to Stanley's acquittal they declared, with respect to the police:

"In place of this unaccountable body, we need to fight for direct democratic control of security bodies by the workers and the oppressed through trade unions and marginalized community organizations. Judges and prosecutors at all levels need to be elected with the right of recall at any time, so that these 'arbiters of justice' are accountable to the people. Justice should be democratic."

This amounts to a call for "workers control" of the bourgeoisie's apparatus of state repression. The reformist illusion in a "democratic" capitalist justice system "accountable to the people" goes hand in hand with Fightback's longstanding position that the police are "workers in uniform." This is false: the cops and courts

Cops Gun Down Black Barber

Chicago Protests

This is America, where a cop's badge is a license to kill, and to kill black people in particular. On July 14, in Chicago's South Shore neighborhood, police shot dead 37-year-old Harith "Snoop" Augustus near the shop where he worked. Police claimed that Augustus, a quiet and popular barber, was "exhibiting characteristics of an armed person," the same racist pretext for blowing away twelve-year-old Tamir Rice with his toy gun in 2014. The Chicago Police Department quickly released edited body-cam video, without audio, to bolster its case. The video captured Augustus trying to show the cops an ID that appears to be his Firearm Owners Identification card, then being grabbed at from behind by officers and, seconds later, falling dead in the street. According to witnesses, Augustus was shot in the back at least five times. The evidence produced by the thugs-inblue proves one thing: this father of a fiveyear-old was executed for no other reason than being black and exercising his right to own and carry a gun.

In a July 21 statement, the distraught family of Augustus wrote: "The manner of Harith's tragic death is all too familiar and seems so unnecessary." Such atrocities are commonplace in the U.S., and certainly S.O.P. in "Segregation City," where cops have terrorized black neighborhoods under Democratic Party administrations for nearly ninety years. Former Chicago police detective Jon Burge and his cohorts were notorious for torturing black "suspects" from the 1970s to the 1990s, with the complicity of city officials. In 2017, after a Justice Department investigation found the Chicago police to have treated blacks and other minorities "as animals or subhuman," that same force began flooding the streets under a federal "law and order" push.

On the night Augustus was killed, some 100 outraged protesters from the neigh-

the working class be brought to bear in defense of Indigenous peoples. Because of its role in production, the working class uniquely has the power and class interest to liberate all who suffer under capitalist rule. There are a few important examples of the integration of Indigenous peoples into key sectors of the working class. In 2016, nearly half of the 2,500 workers at Cameco in northern Saskatchewan, one of the largest uranium mines in the world, were Indigenous. In Quebec and Ontario, Mohawk workers have been concentrated among the ironworkers. A class-struggle leadership of the unions would mobilize labour's power to champion the fight against Indigenous oppression, taking concrete steps such as aggressive union-run recruitment and training programs. This would be a first step toward breaking the cycle of unemployment and social marginalization. Labour must also be mobilized

against acts of racist state terror. Only an egalitarian socialist society under workers rule will lay the material basis for the eradication of Indigenous oppression. This requires a socialist revolution that smashes the capitalist state and replaces it with a workers state. A workers government would quickly move to mobilize the social resources and spend the money necessary to provide a decent life for Indigenous peoples and redress the hideous oppression from which they have long suffered, promoting their voluntary integration on the basis of complete equality while providing the fullest possible regional autonomy for those who desire it.

to understand why he would own a gun. He's a barber—a cash-heavy business—in a relatively high-crime area." More than 150 years after slavery was defeated in the Civil War, in significant measure through the skill and courage of armed black Union soldiers, black people are still denied the full rights of U.S. citizens. When it comes to the Second Amendment right to bear arms, the cops don't even pretend that a black man might have the same rights as a white man. In 2016, Philando Castile was shot dead in his car by a Minnesota cop seconds after politely informing the cop that he had a gun and a license to carry it.

In Chicago, the Democratic Party has demonstrated time and again its skill in administering racist American capitalism and wielding the machinery of repression against black people and the poor. It was the cop-loving Democratic mayor Rahm Emanuel—Barack Obama's former henchman-who covered up the video of the police killing of Laquan McDonald, sparking mass protests nearly three years ago. Now Emanuel and other Democratic Party functionaries are worried that the September murder trial of the cop who shot McDonald will unleash more protests.

Reflecting widespread hatred of Eman-

uel, one of the chants at the July 16 protest was "No More Democrats!" Such rage is more than justified. But it must be given an organized political expression. We fight to break workers and minorities from the Democratic Party and all capitalist parties. A multiracial revolutionary workers party would provide the necessary leadership for struggle against oppression and exploitation.

Hostile to this view are the so-called "progressive" Democrats and black front men, backed by the pro-capitalist tradeunion bureaucracy and an array of reformist lackeys who call themselves "socialist." They are practiced in subverting righteous anger against cop terror back into Democratic Party channels—whether through bogus "community policing" or cop "accountability" councils. In 2016, the outpouring of protests over the killing of McDonald was converted into a campaign to oust Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez for her role in the cover-up. The result was her replacement by a black Democrat, Kim Foxx, who has since overseen the same daily police violence and murder. Decades of black faces in high places and community policing schemes have offered no solution.

This is America, a country founded on chattel slavery, where black lives don't matter to the ruling class. The job of the cops is to "serve and protect" the capitalist masters who lord it over a society rooted in the exploitation of the working class and the forcible segregation of blacks at the bottom.

The workplace and factory floor remain rare pockets of integration in this deeply segregated city. Chicago has a significant multiracial labor movement with tremendous potential social power. Class struggle for the common class interests of black, white, Latino and immigrant workers, championing the cause of the poor and all the oppressed, can help break down racial divisions and advance the fight to overturn the capitalist order through socialist revolution. To make the workers conscious of this task requires a revolutionary party that fuses the power of labor to the anger of the ghettos and barrios. We are dedicated to the fight to forge such a party.■

Attack on MOVE 1978 We Will Not Forget!

August 8 marks the 40th anniversary of the vicious cop assault on MOVE in Philadelphia's Powelton Village neighborhood. A mostly black commune advocating the right to armed self-defense, MOVE had been under a months-long police siege when an army of 600 cops assaulted their home and fired thousands of rounds of ammunition. After MOVE members and their children surrendered, police publicly beat, dragged, kicked and stomped a shirtless Delbert Africa nearly to death. A cop was killed in the ferocious police crossfire, and nine MOVE members were framed up and imprisoned on bogus murder charges. A number of witnesses testified that no gunshots came from the MOVE house. Three months prior to the attack the police had removed from the house all weapons, which were found to be inoperable.

Today, forty years later, six MOVE members remain in prison: Janine, Janet, Mike, Eddie, Chuck and Delbert Africa. Merle and Phil Africa died in Pennsylvania prisons under suspicious circumstances. Last month, Debbie Africa became the first of the MOVE 9 to be released on parole, at the same time that Janet and Janine

assault was a dress rehearsal for the cop/FBI bombing of MOVE's Osage Avenue home on 13 May 1985, killing eleven, five of them children, and turning to ash and rubble an entire black neighborhood. We will not forget these racist atrocities, which graphically demonstrate American capitalism's murderous vendetta against anvone who defends black self-defense. Free all the MOVE prisoners!



for his "classiest move" and hailed the nominee as a judge "who prioritizes the Constitution's original meaning." Yes, and that original meaning included slavery.

At its inception, when the U.S. was marked by "free labor" capitalism in the North and chattel slavery in the South, the Supreme Court was designed as part of a system of "checks and balances" to insulate government from the unpredictable masses. As Alexander Hamilton put it in the Federalist Papers, its purpose is to be "an essential safeguard against the effects of occasional ill humors in the society." The Supreme Court, with its august judges appointed for life, has not a little in common with Britain's aristocratic, unelected House of Lords (though given the current Court's Christian zealotry, the Iranian ayatollahs' Guardian Council may be a more apt analogy).

Four years before the outbreak of the Civil War, the Supreme Court declared in the 1857 Dred Scott decision that a black man "had no rights which the white man was bound to respect." In 1896, the Court sanctified "separate but equal" segregation as the law of the land, a hallmark in the crushing of black rights that had been gained through the smashing of slavery but rolled back with the defeat of Radical




Dred Scott. In 1857, racist Supreme Court ruled black people "had no rights which the white man was bound to respect."

Reconstruction. During World War II, the Supreme Court approved the racist internment of some 120,000 Japanese Americans, ordered by the Democratic Party administration of liberal icon Franklin Delano Roosevelt and implemented by California attorney general Earl Warren.

A prominent Republican politician, Warren was later appointed to the Supreme Court by Republican president Eisenhower. Liberals who push reliance on the courts as a motor for social progress hark back to that same Earl Warren, the Chief Justice defining the "golden years" of the Supreme Court from 1953 to 1969. Starting with the 1954 Brown v. Board

of Education ruling against segregated education and over the next two decades, a series of Supreme Court rulings gave some meaning to the protections that most Americans are taught are in the Constitution, like upholding due process rights.

These reforms were not handed down by generous or fair-minded judges. Such rulings, including the 1973 Roe decision, came in the context of convulsive social struggles, starting with the marches against Jim Crow and culminating in the huge protests against the Vietnam War. Racist segregation and the repressive social climate had also become a liability for the U.S. rulers as they postured as the great defender of "democracy" in the Cold War against the Soviet Union.

Aided by the liberals and other misleaders that tethered such struggle to the Democratic Party, the capitalist rulers worked to contain, co-opt and eventually destroy the mass civil rights movement and the burgeoning radicalization centered on opposition to the Vietnam War. And they succeeded. With minimal personnel changes, the Supreme Court immediately started to erode the gains of the preceding 20 years, signaled by the restoration of the death penalty in 1976. The devastation of lives and the shredding of civil liberties over the past few decades, including a massive bipartisan increase of government surveillance, were carried out not only by Reagan and Bush I and II, but also by Democrats Carter, Clinton and Obama.

Don't Bow to the Democrats— For Class Struggle!

As Trump announced his new justice pick, Democratic Senators Elizabeth Warren and Cory Booker, along with their "democratic-socialist" adjunct Bernie Sanders, headed a rally on the Supreme Court steps amid signs reading "Stop Kavanaugh" and "Protect Our Courts." Democrats are being called on to "pack the courts," i.e., increase the number of justices to offset Trump's appointments once the Democrats regain the presidency. A June 28 article posted on jacobinmag. com, a project of the Democratic Socialists of America (DSA), titled, "In Defense of Court-Packing," claimed that "lasting progressive change" lies through such

The British capitalist rulers today do not need to resort to fascism to crush the workers movement. However, the capitalist rulers hold the fascist shock troops in reserve so that they can be unleashed against the working people in times of social upheaval. The fascists today are small, but the workers movement must understand it is precisely when they are weak that the fascists must be crushed.

At bottom, the union misleaders and the reformist left push illusions that the way to combat fascism is by electing a Corbyn-led Labour [Party] government. In contrast, the Spartacist League's perspective of mobilising union power to stop the fascists also aims to imbue the working class with consciousness of its social power and revolutionary potential. This is a step towards building a revolutionary party, a champion of all the oppressed, which can lead the working class to overturn the depraved capitalist system which is itself the source of fascist barbarism. ■ schemes to gain control of the Court, as their hero FDR once threatened to do.

For its part, the reformist International Socialist Organization (ISO) puts forward a variant of how to tinker with the capitalist state, writing in the article, "Without Struggle, There Is No Roe," that Kavanaugh "could be rejected if the Democrats are forced to put up a real fight" (socialistworker.org, 20 July). The underlying premise of both the ISO and the DSA is that the capitalist state is a neutral body that can be swayed, and that bourgeois democracy can be made to represent the interests of the exploited and oppressed. But as Bolshevik leader V. I. Lenin wrote in a polemic against the granddaddy of the ISO and DSA, German Social Democrat Karl Kautsky: "Bourgeois democracy, although a great historical advance in comparison with medievalism, always remains, and under capitalism is bound to remain, restricted, truncated, false and hypocritical, a paradise for the rich and a snare and deception for the exploited, for the poor" (The Proletarian Revolution and the Renegade Kautsky, 1918).

The strategy of the ISO is to call on the Democrats to resist. Given that the Democratic Party leadership today is about as appealing as a cold sore, the reformist lackeys try to refurbish the Democrats' credentials by promoting pseudosocialists in the party. The recent victory of the DSA's Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez in the New York Congressional primary election has been celebrated as an opening for the left, with ISO leaders openly calling to work with such Democrats to "deepen the confidence of our side and strengthen the fighting capacity of the working class" (socialistworker.org, 23 July). In fact, they are acting to keep the working class chained to its class enemy, to the very capitalist party that has targeted immigrants as terrorists and criminals, ripped up democratic rights and beefed up the machinery of state repression, and unleashed U.S. military might against oppressed peoples from the Near East to Africa and beyond.

Even over abortion, Democratic administrations have acquiesced and colluded in the decades-long Republican-led drive to end women's basic right to terminate an unwanted pregnancy. In 1980, the Supreme Court affirmed the Hyde Amendment—signed into law by Jimmy Carter—that denied Medicaid funds for abortion. In the 1990s, Bill Clinton, while axing welfare for mothers, presided over a barrage of additional abortion restrictions. In 2010, Obama ensured that federal funds from the Affordable Care Act would not be used for abortions.

Meanwhile, the bureaucrats who run the trade unions have refused to wage even defensive class battles, instead pushing reliance on the government, its courts and supposed "friends of labor" Democrats. Their central argument for opposing Janus is that they needed a dues base in order to keep a lid on class struggle. American Federation of Teachers president Randi Weingarten put it baldly in an amicus brief to the Supreme Court, warning that an anti-union decision would disrupt "labor peace." It is that program of class collaboration that has helped decimate the unions throughout decades of anti-labor and racist attacks.

In "Marxism and Reformism" (1913), Lenin noted how the capitalists "grant reforms with one hand and with the other always take them back, reduce them to nought, use them to enslave the workers, to divide them into separate groups and perpetuate wage-slavery." While the reformists "restrict the aims and activities of the working class to the winning of reforms," the goal of revolutionary socialists is to use reforms to broaden the class struggle. Lenin explained, "The more independent the working-class movement, the deeper and broader its aims, and the freer it is from reformist narrowness the easier it is for the workers to retain and utilise improvements."

There are urgent needs in this country: for decent, high-wage jobs and quality, integrated housing and schools for all; for free abortion on demand as part of socialized health care; for full citizenship rights for all immigrants. It is in the vital interest of the multiracial working class to mobilize through hard class struggle, in defense of itself and all the oppressed. It is through intervention into such struggles that the Spartacist League seeks to forge a multiracial revolutionary workers party. Modeled on the Bolsheviks, such a party would serve as a "tribune of the people," fighting all manifestations of oppression as part of the fight for workers revolution. With the proletariat in power, justice will be in the hands of workers councils committed to rebuilding this society on a socialist basis, and the bourgeoisie's supremely reactionary Supreme Court will be a relic of a barbaric past, like the medieval rack and the slaveowner's lash.

against the fascists. The state is not "neutral" between the fascists and the workers movement. The police, along with the army, the courts and the prisons are the core of the capitalist state—the repressive apparatus that defends the property and the interests of the capitalists against the working class and oppressed. The job of the police includes breaking workers strikes, brutalising black and Asian people and spying on leftists and trade unionists.

Reliance on the cops for protection against the fascists is suicidal, but that is precisely the programme of Unite Against Fascism (UAF) and Stand Up To Racism (SUTR). The 14 July counter-protest jointly organised by the UAF and SUTR ultimately relied on police to defend the 3,000 antifascist demonstrators against much bigger forces of fascists and other reactionaries.

workers staged another walkout five days later. So far, the workers have gained one concession—their jobs are to be included in the state's category of "heavy and unhealthy occupations," which entitles them to certain pension benefits. The union announced that it would conduct further stoppages if COSCO did not agree to negotiations. But the strikes have been suspended following a July 11 announcement by the union of an "oral agreement" that, it says, will meet the workers' demands for stable work and increased manning.

The COSCO workers' struggle has struck a chord throughout the key maritime sector in Greece. A successful outcome to this fight could be a major boost to the Greek working class, which has been bent but not broken by a decade of ferocious capitalist austerity. It could also inspire workers elsewhere in Europe facing attacks on their own jobs and living standards. Victory to the COSCO workers!

Commenting on the strike, the ruling Syriza party complained that the problems faced by dock workers were a result of COSCO operating "exclusively through subcontractors and thus maximizing their profits while at the same time hiding from their responsibilities as the real employers" (kathimerini.gr, 2 June). This is sheer hypocrisy coming from Syriza, which notwithstanding its "radical left" moniker is a bourgeois party. In 2015, Syriza disregarded the overwhelming "no" vote in the referendum on EU austerity. Today, it continues to wield the knife on behalf of the Frankfurt bankers and Greek shipping magnates.

Dock workers at COSCO are indeed largely hired through agencies on starvation-wage "flexible" contracts that do not guarantee stable employment or basic work rights. Workers complain about the lack of proper training and the climate of intimidation that reigns at the port, with "nightclubstyle bouncers" employed to enforce discipline. It is essential for the unions to fight to drive out the subcontracting parasites and for the immediate hiring of *all* workers on a full-time, permanent basis with decent wages and conditions. *For union control of hiring! For union control over safety!*

The appalling conditions that COSCO dock workers and other workers in Greece confront are a direct result of the austerity measures, including privatization of the ports and other infrastructure, dictated by the EU and IMF in exchange for a "bailout" of Greece. In fact, the bailout was meant for the German and French banks holding the debt while working people are made to pay. The pauperization and degradation of Greek workers is an extreme version of what is happening to workers throughout Europe as the EU bosses seek to increase the exploitation of their wage slaves. An article in the U.S. journal the Nation (1 June), titled "How Greece's Busiest Port Reveals the Perils of Privatization," quotes one dock worker saying: "We know that we in Greece are part of a particularly harsh neoliberal experiment, but it is just the beginning. Today in Greece, tomorrow in Europe. The whole labor system is tending to more flexible systems of work."

The EU is the vehicle with which the capitalist powers in Europe—with German imperialism in the driver's seat seek to plow through the wages and conditions of workers, including in the stronger economies such as Germany itself. Maritime workers in Europe have had to fight such attacks as the unionbusting EU "Port Packages." In January 2006, a solid strike against Port Package 2 that shut down the port of Hamburg, Germany, was followed by strikes elsewhere in Europe. Last year, dock workers in Spain struck against the imposition of EU regulations for "free enterprise," i.e., free of unions. The EU consortium has devastated weaker countries in Europe like Greece, Spain and Portugal, while also serving as a trade bloc against the rival U.S. and Japanese imperialists. *Greece out* of the EU and the euro! For a Socialist United States of Europe!

China Is Not Capitalist

COSCO—the China Ocean Shipping Company—has operated Piers II and III of the Piraeus cargo port since October 2009. In 2016, as part of the fire sale of state assets to service crippling debt repayments, the Syriza government sold a 67 percent stake in the Port of Piraeus to COSCO. The privatization was rightly opposed at the time by port workers, who understood that the sell-off would be accompanied by attacks on their wages, working conditions and union rights.

In their just struggle, the Piraeus dock workers are up against COSCO, a Chinese state-owned enterprise. COSCO is not a capitalist employer but part of the collectivized economy of the People's Republic of China, a deformed workers state where political power is in the hands of

The 1949 Chinese Revolution over-

The 1949 Chinese Revolution overthrew the rule of the capitalists and landlords and tore the country out of the clutches of the imperialists who had held it in thrall. The bourgeois state was smashed by Mao Zedong's peasant-based People's Liberation Army and replaced by a workers state that expropriated the exploiters. The subsequent creation of an economy centrally based on collectivized property forms laid the basis for a surge in industrial development and tremendous gains for the worker and peasant masses.

The establishment of the Chinese workers state was a historic gain for the working class internationally. However, unlike the state that issued from the 1917 October Revolution in Russia, led by the Bolsheviks of V.I. Lenin and Leon Trotsky, the workers state in China was deformed from the outset by the rule of a nationalist bureaucracy fundamentally similar to

the privileged Chinese Communist Party (CCP) bureaucracy. The CCP regime's overseas economic operations often entail attacks on wages and working conditions. These attacks against the workers are not inevitable, as with capitalist enterprises, but rather part of a policy reflecting the bureaucracy's conservative and narrow national interests. At Piraeus, such a policy means working hand in hand with the EU masters in bleeding the workers.

COSCO's outrageous treatment of its Piraeus workforce includes 12-hour work shifts for a pittance, many times without even the right to a 30-minute break. Meanwhile, others can't get enough work. The CEO of the port, Fu Chengqiu, or "Captain Fu," exemplifies the CCP regime's gross paternalism. In Spiegel online (4 September 2015), Fu dismissed unions as "superfluous" and railed against union leaders promising "more money for less work." He continued, "If you want a higher salary you first need to work hard. Not lie on the beach and drink beer. Learn from the Germans! Work hard, never be lazy and always work seriously. Hard work—happy life." This anti-worker hostility accompanies the Stalinist program of "socialism in one country" (or "socialism with Chinese characteristics") which is inimical to proletarian internationalism and gives genuine socialism a bad name. It can also provide ammunition to anti-Communists seeking to channel anger against such abuses into support for the imperialists' drive for capitalist counterrevolution in China.

Trotskyists support workers fighting for union rights and decent wages and benefits at COSCO. At the same time, we fight efforts by those who undermine the need to defend the Chinese deformed workers state against imperialism. Like many in the workers movement, the KKE, a reformist Stalinist party, argues that China "is an integral part of the international imperialist system" (Communist Review No. 6, 2010). The KKE argues that "China, particularly from the 1980's and onwards, has linked its economy with the international capitalist market. This is a fact which is not denied by the Chinese leadership, but is indeed extolled by it." Just because China engages in world trade the one that came to power in the Soviet Union in a political counterrevolution led by Stalin beginning in 1923-24.

Two years after Mao's death in 1976, the CCP under Deng Xiaoping initiated a program of "market reforms," loosening state control over production and trade and opening the country to some capitalist investment by Western and Japanese corporations, as well as by the offshore Chinese bourgeoisie. A Chinese capitalist class has developed also on the mainland, although this class is deprived of political power. It is commonplace for bourgeois ideologues—and most of the left—to assert that capitalism has been restored in China, or is irreversibly being restored. Capitalist counterrevolution, however, would need to triumph at the political level, through smashing the workers state and installing an imperialist-backed, anti-Communist regime. That would be a disaster for the world proletariat.

Despite "market reforms," the core elements of China's economy remain collectivized. State-owned enterprises dominate in the strategic industrial sectors, nationalization of the land has prevented the emergence of a class of large-scale agrarian capitalists, and state banks control financing. China's explosive economic growth rate over the past two decades has outstripped the imperialist countries as well as "emerging" neocolonial capitalist countries such as India.

We support China's right to trade in order to obtain whatever it needs to further the workers state's development. China's overseas investments are not driven by the profit motive, as is inherent in capitalist enterprises, but by the need to acquire raw materials and advanced technology for its collectivized industries at home and to facilitate its international trade, including by developing railways, roads and ports. At the same time, we recognize that its investments abroad are not determined by revolutionary internationalism but rather by the CCP regime's policies, rooted in the Stalinist dogmas of "socialism in one country" as well as "peaceful coexistence with imperialism."

The imperialists who "lost China" in 1949 are committed to getting it back for

untrammeled capitalist exploitation. As Trotskyists, the International Communist League stands for the unconditional military defense of China against imperialism and any attempts at internal counterrevolution. To defend and extend the gains of the Chinese Revolution requires a proletarian political revolution to oust the CCP bureaucracy and replace it with a regime of workers democracy committed to the fight for world socialism.

Inheriting the overseas operations of Chinese state enterprises, a government of workers and peasants councils would honor union rights and raise pay and benefits above local scale. Such a regime would also expropriate the bourgeois elements that have emerged in China as well as the Hong Kong tycoons. Above all, it would follow the lead of the early Soviet workers state in promoting workers revolution throughout the world.

For a Class-Struggle Leadership!

While the Greek working people have shown a determination to struggle against the attacks of the bosses, the current leadership of the trade unions is beholden to the capitalist system and to class collaboration. A new leadership is needed—one that understands that workers have no interests in common with the bosses and acts accordingly. Such a leadership would fight for what the working class needs, not for what the bosses say they can afford. This necessarily includes opposition to the EU and its currency tool, the euro, and forging class solidarity with workers across borders.

It is necessary to employ the weapons of class struggle, such as strikes defended by mass pickets. The Golden Dawn fascists have grown menacingly amid the despair wrought by capitalism. They are a deadly danger to immigrants and other minorities, to the left and to the labor movement. The present workers' leadership has largely ignored the fascist danger, but the mass pickets at COSCO that kept out the scabs and fascists showed the potential for mass working-class action to crush Golden Dawn.

The suffering of the Greek working people shows the brutal workings of the capitalist system, in which production is organized not to satisfy life's necessities for the masses—decent employment, housing, pensions, medical care, etc.—but to produce profits for the tiny number of super-rich capitalist exploiters. The basic needs of the population can be achieved only by the working class taking the productive wealth of society into its own hands. The working class and its allies among the oppressed need to fight for a government that will act in their interests and be subordinated to them. Such a government cannot be achieved in a parliamentary framework but only through a proletarian revolution that sweeps away the capitalist state. Greece Victory to COSCO Port Workers!

The following article was written by our comrades of the Trotskyist Group of Greece.

ATHENS, July 23—At the end of May and beginning of June, hundreds of workers employed by the Chinese state-owned shipping giant COSCO at the Port of Piraeus carried out significant labor action against the horrible conditions prevailing at the container terminals. On May 30, workers throughout Greece had downed tools in a one-day national strike against the latest raft of austerity measures demanded by the European Union (EU) and imposed by the Syriza-ANEL government. Among them were the COSCO dock workers, led by their union ENEDEP, who defied management threats to have them arrested if they joined the strike. They stayed out for

two more days, pressing their demands for stable, full-time work, increased manning levels, collective bargaining and health and safety measures, as well as a hike in their abysmally low wages. The highly

dangerous work conditions at the port have led to many injuries and claimed the life of a worker last year.

A strike rally outside COSCO was joined by thousands of other workers, including

dock workers from another union who struck for two days. Those workers, organized by the Dockworkers' Union-Port of Piraeus, have seen their own wages gutted and are also fighting for collective bargaining rights. The rally was supported by seamen's unions and the Labor Center of Piraeus, which is dominated by PAME, a trade-union body associated with the Communist Party (KKE). Joint pickets were successful in completely shutting down COSCO for the first time in its almost nine years of operation at Piraeus, beating back efforts by management to break the strike with scabs (including Golden Dawn fascists) and through the courts.

A mass general union assembly suspended the strike on June 1, but COSCO continued on page 7

London: Fascist Attack on Union Leader

We reprint below a July 21 leaflet issued by our comrades of the Spartacist League/Britain.

On 14 July, following a rally of some 6,000 supporters of jailed fascist English Defence League (EDL) founder Tommy Robinson, a gang of fascist thugs launched a vicious assault on members of the RMT [National Union of Rail, Maritime and Transport Workers] union as they sat drinking in a Westminster pub. Assistant general secretary of the union Steve Hedley and his partner Bridget Power were hospitalised after Robinson's supporters hurled glasses and metal chairs at them. Several other RMT members were injured in the attack. Hedley had earlier spoken at a counter-protest against Robinson. True to form, the police detained both Hedley and Power for having the temerity to defend themselves. After her release from hospital with bruised ribs, Power was held in police custody for several hours.

The same day as the attack on the RMT, the fascists surrounded a London bus, terrorising the driver—a Muslim woman wearing a hijab. In June, 15,000 Robinson supporters, some giving Nazi salutes, marched through London before attacking anti-racist counter-protesters. A march in Leeds, also in June, was followed some days later by the firebombing of a mosque and a Sikh gurdwara [temple]. These attacks underline that fascism is not a system of bad ideas which can be defeated through exposure, or argued away. Fascists differ from right-wing ideologues such as UKIP [UK Independence Party] in that they are paramilitary gangs whose purpose is racist terror and ultimately the destruction of the workers movement.

That fascist scum feel bold enough to assault a prominent leader of one of the country's most powerful unions is an ominous development. The RMT organises tens of thousands, including large numbers of black and Asian workers. This represents considerable social power that the fascists should fear.

While trade unions have endorsed the recent anti-fascist counter-protests, their mobilisation has been limited to small numbers of workers behind union banners. The organisers of these protests see the unions as just one more constituency alongside "faith groups" and leftists. What's needed is not bringing out trade union members as atomised individuals, but mobilising disciplined contingents of unionised workers. Standing at the head of the oppressed, the workers movement uniquely has the numbers, organisation and power to sweep the fascists off the streets.

It is the decaying capitalist order that creates the conditions in which the fascists thrive and the fight against fascism is therefore inseparable from the fight to overthrow the capitalist system. Mobilising the unions to defend workers and the

oppressed requires a political fight against the trade union bureaucracy, which is wedded to capitalism and to class collaboration and has not waged an effective fight to defend union members against austerity, much less defend minorities.

The police persecution of Hedley and Power illustrates the folly of looking to the forces of the capitalist state to act continued on page 6
